


Fourth of July - Dogs and Fireworks Don't Mix

In the United States, July 4th is around the corner, along with the fireworks that inevitably come with this holiday. Almost all humans with canines in the U.S. declare this day the worst day of the year for their dogs. Veterinarians say that July 3rd is usually the most trafficked day in their offices, with clients coming in to get drugs for their dogs.

### Tips for providing a safe July 4th for your Canine Household:

- 1. Make sure your dog gets plenty of exercise earlier in the day.
- 2. Keep your dogs <u>inside</u> during fireworks, preferably with human companionship. If it's hot, air conditioning will help. Bringing your dogs to a fireworks display is never a good idea.
- 3. Provide a safe place inside for your dogs to retreat. When scared of sounds they can't orient, dogs often prefer small enclosed areas. If your dog is comfortable in a crate, that is a good option.
- 4. If possible, keep the windows and curtains closed to dampen the sound and brightness of fireworks. Covering the crate to remove visual stimulation can also be helpful.
- 5. Make sure all your dogs are wearing ID tags with a properly fitting collar. Dogs have been known to become Houdini around the 4th of July.
- 6. Give your dog something fun to do like a frozen Kong filled with his favorite treats.
- 7. There are two canine wraps on the market that reportedly help sound-sensitive dogs. The *original Anxiety Wrap* was invented by professional dog trainer Susan Sharpe, CPDT-KA. The patented design uses acupressure and maintained pressure to reduce stress. The *Thundershirt* is also a wrap for your dog that provides gentle, constant pressure.
- 8. Turn up the sound on the TV or play music to mask the loud sounds of fireworks.
- 9. Contact your veterinarian for "doggie downers" (aka tranquilizers) to be sure that you are giving your dog the proper dosage according to its age and weight. Remember to ask your vet how soon you should dose your dog <u>before</u> the fireworks begin.
- 10. If possible, take your dog to an inside area that will not be having fireworks on July 4<sup>th</sup>.

... and they sent us this at-home photo of Shadow in Mike's arm. Boy, does he have the good life now!!










## ... and ... we're back to canine adoptions ...


