


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Armed and Furry . . . taken from AARP Bulletin


"Cayce" is going home with his new family in Silt !!

De-Skunking Your Dog . . . and maybe you too

Skunks live all over the place, and if your dog gets curious about one, she may end up with a face full of stink. If your pooch gets sprayed, there are ways you can rid her of the scent without having to buy up every can of tomato juice in the area. Over-the-counter products (such as Nature's Miracle Skunk Odor Remover) are a quick fix, but if you don't have that on hand, you can prep the solution below.

Step 1: Keep Fido outside

You'll probably want to keep your dog outside while you get it together so she doesn't carry the smell indoors. Check her eyes; if they're irritated or red, immediately flush them with cool water.

Step 2: Mix the Ingredients

Mix together:

- 1 quart of 3-percent hydrogen peroxide (available at any pharmacy)
- 1/4 cup baking soda
- 1 teaspoon liquid dishwashing soap

Wearing rubber gloves, wash your dog with this solution immediately after she's been sprayed. DO NOT get the solution in her eyes. (If you don't have peroxide, baking soda, and liquid soap on hand, use vinegar diluted with water.)

Caution: Do NOT store this mixture or make it ahead of time, as the mixture could explode if left in a bottle.

Step 3: Clean and rinse

Rub the mixture through her fur, but don't leave it on too long (peroxide can bleach fur). Rinse her thoroughly.

Step 4: Shampoo

Next, wash your dog with pet shampoo and rinse thoroughly. By now, she should be de-skunked and smelling sweet. Thoroughly towel-dry your dog, and be sure to place her in a warm, sunny room for the next couple of hours so that she doesn't get chilled.

Owner cleanup

If your dog rubbed some of the stink onto you, you can rid your clothes of the smell by using regular laundry detergent mixed with a half-cup of baking soda.

She and Allison, another DCHS volunteer, were able to wrangle six kittens from a property in mid-May, and then another four kittens only two days later. Joan was able to fit 10 kittens into her foster home, but that was the limit. Allison had to take in three more kittens later at her place until Joan had available space. Thirteen kittens were a lot to handle, but those ladies did a super job and soon the little ones were moving out the door to new adopters.

Spay - Neuter Information

One of the goals of the Delta County Humane Society is to reduce the unnecessary puppy & kitten overpopulation in our county. FYI, if you qualify as a low-income resident of Delta County, we do presently have funds available to assist you in spaying or neutering your companion animals.

You can access a Spay/Neuter application online. Go to our website http://www.deltacountyhumanesociety.org
- click on Spay/Neuter. Then click on Spay/Neuter
Subsidy Application. Read the Instruction Box, complete your application, and click on Submit. It's as easy as that & your application is instantly submitted to DCHS for processing. No Computer? No problem? Just call our phone #874-2149. Leave a message that you would like a spay/neuter application - be sure to leave your name and mailing address too. Please note that mail-in applications sometimes take up to 4 weeks to process.




Summer's here - here are some ways to keep your dog cool in the hot temperatures

. . . .

- 1. **Know which breeds are at risk for overheating.** Certain breeds with "pushed-in" faces, such as Bulldogs, French bulldogs, Boxers, dogs that are overweight or have thick coats, and injured or geriatric dogs, present a greater challenger to owners. Keeping these dogs inside on warm days would be the wise choice.
- 2. **Remember that heat stroke can occur even at 70 degrees Fahrenheit.** Heat exhaustion can occur in just 15 minutes, at temperatures as low as 70 degrees Fahrenheit, and it may be hard to detect. Take your pet to the vet at the first sign of heat stroke it's better to be safe than sorry.
- 3. Refill their water bowls often add ice cubes throughout the day
- 4. **Keep them off hot asphalt.** Watch what they're walking on if you can't put your hand on the ground for 5 seconds, it's not safe for their paws.
- 5. **Go for walks when the sun is not so intense.** Do walks earlier in the morning or late in the evening when the ground is cooler, or walk on the grass.
- 6. **Let them play in the water.** If you don't have a pond of water handy, even a kiddie pool in the backyard will help to cool your pooch.
- 7. **Leave them at home.** We all know that dogs love their car rides, but common sense will tell you that it is much better for them to be left at home where they can stay cool and comfortable.
- 8. **Use a cooling gel pack.** Cooling packs that can be inserted into vests or placed on beds can help regulate your pet's body temperatures.
- 9. Watch for signs of heat stroke. Symptoms of heat exhaustion include restlessness, anxiousness, pacing, bright red gums, and rapid heart rate while at rest (check their pulse by placing your hand on their chest). You can also check your pet's temperature via armpit or rectum; any armpit temp over 104 F is problematic, while any rectal temp over 105 F is dangerous. In more severe cases, your pet may exhibit symptoms like bruising, bleeding, wobbly or "drunk" walking, vomiting, diarrhea, and/or seizures.

If you want to feel how a dog feels on a warm day, just put on a fur coat.
