but let's practice the spay and neuter solution all year long...

An unspayed dog, her mate, and all of their offspring, plus the offsprings' puppies, if none are neutered or spayed, add up to:

1 year = 16
2 years = 128
4 years = 2,048
5 years = 12,288
6 years = 67,000



An unspayed cat, her mate, and all of their offspring, plus the offsprings' kittens, if none are neutered or spayed, add up to:

1 year = 12
3 years = 376
6 years = 66,088
9 years = 11,066,077



When to Spay or Neuter Your Pet

- For dogs: While the traditional age for neutering is six to nine months, puppies as young as eight weeks old can be neutered as long as they're healthy. Dogs can be neutered as adults as well, although there's a slightly higher risk of post-operative complications in older dogs, dogs that are overweight or dogs that have health problems.
- For cats: It is generally considered safe for kittens as young as eight weeks old to be spayed or neutered. In animal shelters, surgery is often performed at this time so that kittens can be sterilized prior to adoption. In an effort to avoid the start of urine spraying and eliminate the chance for pregnancy, it's advisable to schedule the surgery before your own cat reaches five months of age. It is possible to spay a female cat while she's in heat.

So here are the top ten reasons why a dog makes a better date this Valentine's Day:


1. Dogs don't talk. I could elaborate, but I think we can all agree this is a good thing.




